Highland Park to Pasadena.

MOTA was the creation of Barry Herlihy, president of Heritage Square Museum. In recent years the event has attracted some 4,000 visitors.

This year at the Lummis Home, the Historical Society is presenting the musical group from the San Diego area, Los Californios, who will perform the songs of old California, including ones recorded and saved by Lummis.

Also on the program are

Daniel Lewis, who will repeat his chautauqua performance in costume as Charles Lummis, and Mark Thompson, author of *American Character*, a biography of Lummis, who

will speak about the man and his West.

Tours of the Lummis Home, an outdoor book sale and plant sales are also featured, all the activities planned and coordinated by Tara Fansler of the HSSC Staff. Mark your calendar and plan to attend MOTA Day.

2002 Neuerburg Award Winner Announced

THE 2002 NORMAN
Neuerburg Award for the best book on early California history (to 1850) goes to A Voyage to California and the Sandwich Islands, and Around the World in the Years 1826-1829, edited by August Frugé and Neal Harlow and published by the University of California Press in 1999.

Scholars agree that these written observations of the French sea captain Auguste Duhaut-Cilly rank high among the most important of the early travel accounts of California and the missions.

An engaging new translation combined with skillful editing



make this issue a historical gem among the early eye-witness accounts of Mexican California.

August Frugé is a former director of the UC Press, and the late Neal Harlow was named a FELLOW of the Historical Society in 1989 for his three books on the maps of San Francisco Bay, Los Angeles, and San Diego.

This is the second Neuerburg Award to be given: Al Hurtado won the first for his book, *Intimate Frontiers*. The award includes a \$500 stipend and a leather-bound copy of the book. The awards program is planned for September 21.

Gentle Reader

EACH YEAR AS I LOOK over the list of donations that HSSC has received, I am reminded of the generosity of individuals, corporations, and foundations.

Last fall, individuals contributed over \$90,000 to endow one issue of the *Southern California Quarterly* in honor of Doyce Nunis' 40 years as *pro bono* editor. We are now within \$2,500 of reaching the \$100,000 goal of that campaign.

Last year, foundations and corporations contributed \$179,500 to the general support and operations of HSSC. This total included \$50,000 from The Fritz B. Burns Foundation and \$25,000 each from The Ralph M. Parsons Foundation and The Rose Hills Foundation. (The latter two donations were the second payment each on a two-year, \$50,000 grant commitment.)

Also, \$32,000 from The John Randolph Haynes and Dora Haynes Foundation supported the small grants program for research

on L.A. and Southern California, and \$15,000 from The Wells Fargo Foundation supported the educational outreach to K-12 teachers.

A total of \$17,000 from Vroman's Bookstore and \$8,000 from the Ann Peppers Foundation supported the publication of *Pasadena Sketchbook*, which was also underwritten by interest from the publication endowment provided by The Ahmanson Foundation.

Grants from the Spring Street Foundation (\$10,000), W.P. Whitsett Foundation (\$6,000), Weingart Foundation (\$5,000), Roth Family Foundation (\$2,000), Reid Foundation (\$2,000), and DWP (\$2,000) also contributed to making 2001 a productive year for HSSC in terms of programs, publications, educational outreach, and membership recruitment.

I am grateful for the high level of confidence in the Historical Society as demonstrated by this generous and widespread support.

Arthur H. Clark Co. Celebrates Centennial


THE ARTHUR H. CLARK
Co. has been a vital part of the recent publication success of the Historical Society. The company was founded in Cleveland in 1902, moved to Glendale in 1930, and to Spokane, Washington, in 1989.

Robert Clark, grandson of the founder, has been in charge of the company since 1986, and has directed the production of the *Southern California Quarterly* the past 16 years, including its new and enlarged format. In addition, he has been responsible for the production of 15 of the 34 books published by HSSC since 1990.

"Bob Clark has played a key role in the successful publishing venture of the Historical Society during my years as executive director," notes Tom Andrews, "just as the publications of the Arthur H. Clark Co. shaped my own development as a historian of California and the American West."



2000 Annual Report

To HSSC Members

THE YEAR 2000 WITNESSED several important accomplishments.

Membership continued to grow and membership revenue passed \$75,000. The Board of Directors contributed over \$68,000 to HSSC and the Society's total assets rose to nearly \$1.2 million.

The Fellows Award Gala at The Huntington and the combined Awards Luncheon at the Pasadena University Club continued HSSC's leadership role in recognizing outstanding accomplishments in history and in the teaching of history at the K-12 levels.

The HSSC/Haynes Research Stipends were awarded to 27 scholars working on Los Angeles and Southern California history. The grants were awarded to eleven professors, ten Ph.D. candidates, and six independent historians.

Over \$390,000 in grants and bequests was received by the Historical Society this year, in addition to Board donations and individual gifts. The endowment also grew by \$250,000.

It is indeed an exciting time in Southern California to be involved in history!

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

The St. Francis Dam Disaster Revisted Again and Again

JUST BEFORE MIDNIGHT on March 12, 1928, the St. Francis Dam collapsed taking the lives of some 450 people, its death toll second only to the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire. Next March will mark the 75th anniversary of the St. Francis Dam disaster.

Not waiting until next year, HSSC has offered three tours, led by Paul Rippens, to acquaint members and friends with this tragic story. Originally, Paul offered to lead one tour last October, but a waiting list of over 100 people forced the second and third tours on January 12 and April 6 of this year.

"The demand to go on this tour has exceeded all of our expectations," exclaims Michele Clark, the program coordinator. "It has been a best seller for us."

In 1995 the Historical Society published a special issue of the *Quarterly* entitled, "The St. Francis Dam Disaster Revisted," and plans are underway to republish it in a new format together with Charles Outland's classic, *Man-Made Disaster*. In addition, Paul Rippens is writing a book about the disaster and HSSC board member Jon Wilkman and his wife Nancy are working on a 90 minute documentary for PBS.

If you missed out on these tours, there is plenty more of the St. Francis Dam story coming your way.
