

Executive Director Andrews Retires After 19 Years

he obvious accomplishments that Executive Director Tom Andrews has achieved on behalf of the Historical Society of Southern California are significant. Beginning his work on September 1, 1986, Tom came to the Society with a Ph.D. in history, a reputation as a fine professor and scholar, and as an administrator and fund-raiser. Our board hopes were high and wide. All of them he fulfilled.

At the time we had a budget just shy of \$120,000. Today it is at \$375,000. The membership stood at a respectable 850. Today it is nearly 1,100 loyal supporters. Membership revenue has gone from \$32,000 to over \$90,000.

Thoughts of a sizeable endowment, a vital challenge to ensure the service, programs, and publication of the Quarterly by the Society, seemed but a wistful chimera. Today it stands at nearly \$1,600,000, the possibilities for its growth encouraging.

The less obvious achievements, but enduring and far-reaching, are Tom Andrews' efforts to

expand the horizons of the Society. He began with one part-time staff member. Now the Society has three full-time and five part-time employees including the Lummis Home docents and garden workers.

Today the Society is a major publisher of regional and local history. Since 1986 more than 37 books have appeared under the Society's imprint. These publications have brought to light new information about the people, issues, and historical sites of Los Angeles and southern California.

Tom's tireless efforts to create an endowment for the well respected and century-old Quarterly of the Historical Society of Southern California and to assure its future have produced an important partnership. Through the good offices of California State University, Northridge and its Center for Southern California Studies, the Quarterly will continue under able leadership of new editor Dr. Merry Ovnick and advance the dedication and vision of retiring editor Dr. Doyce B. Nunis Jr.

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Board Members Pay Tribute to Retiring



The innovative "Keeping History Alive" program aimed at school children in Los Angeles has attracted widespread support from foundations and educational leaders. It has set an important template upon which others can build. Likewise, the research stipends for scholars working on southern California history are now funded for its eighth year.

As a result of all these 19 years of tireless effort, Tom Andrews' successor will have a stronger, more purposeful Society upon which to build his or her legacy. On behalf of the Board of the Society, I offer a salute to efforts well achieved and an abiding appreciation to Tom for keeping the Historical Society of Southern California, the oldest in the State, in its preeminent position. We will continue to benefit from his stewardship and from his legacy.
