

HSSC Celebrates a Decade with Andrews at Helm

eptember 1996 marks the ten-year anniversary of Tom Andrews as executive director of the Historical Society of Southern California. To celebrate the occasion—and a decade of accomplishments-members and friends will gather at the Biltmore Hotel on September 21 for a luncheon tribute. Guest speakers Jack Shakely, president of the California Community Foundation and Betsy Bartscherer, community affairs manager for ARCO will be joined by historians Doyce Nunis Jr. and Martin Ridge, each of whom will reflect on the decade 1986-96 in Los Angeles and on the accomplishments of the Historical Society during that tumultuous time.

Distinguished career

Tom Andrews took the helm of the Historical Society in 1986 after a distinguished career at three southern California colleges. His predecessor, Jackie

Wilson, had laid a solid foundation for growth with the development of the Lummis Waterwise Garden and HSSC's first published anthology, each of which attracted significant funding from major corporations and foundations. HSSC was poised for growth, and Tom Andrews was the right historian in the right place at the right time.

Equipment upgraded

With the support of the George Dunning Fund of the California Community Foundation, Andrews systematically upgraded the Society's computers and office equipment, thereby greatly improving communications with members and placing HSSC on an administrative par with comparable not-for-profit organizations.

Mission assessed

Midway through his tenure, Andrews and the board of directors turned their attention to the important matter of the Society's mission. A soul-searching assessment of the Society's activities, programs and services, reflected upon in light of its founders' original intentions, led to a renewed statement of HSSC's mission and the development of a strategic plan for the year 2000.

Rewarding ten years

But history is not made entirely of facts. While Tom Andrews is quick to acknowledge HSSC's roster of achievements during his tenure, he is equally quick to share the credit with his staff, board and HSSC's supporters. With a cup of coffee in one hand, a pencil behind his ear and stacks of books on his desk, Andrews waxes philosophical, "I have been privileged to give something back to history. To see one's ideas and plans come to fruition, to see one's instincts hold true, to build on people and see them respond-all of this has been very rewarding."

Board Giving

HSSC's Board of Directors has set the pace for generous underwriting of Society programs and publications. Beginning in 1986 with its first, organized Annual Board Appeal, the Board has contributed \$245,000 in aggregate for publications, education programs, the Lum-

mis Home and Garden, office equipment, and myriad special projects. Recently, Board members took the lead in kicking off HSSC's Endowment with pledges and gifts totaling an additional \$275,000.

HSSC Produces 25 Publications in Ten Years

Notivated by the strong tradition of publishing the Southern California Quarterly, Tom Andrews embarked on an aggressive program to publish books and other works on Southern California history. The result has been 25 titles since 1986 on subjects ranging from the citrus industry to works on waterwise gardening to our Spanish heritage. The Quarterly, currently in its 35th year of editorship by Doyce Nunis, continues to be recognized as the definitive scholarly journal of research on Southern California history.


Good books based on sound scholarship with a fairly wide appeal is the goal of the Society. History is inclusive and must reach the educated laypublic as well as the academic scholar. Scholarship does not have to be abstruse and pedantic, it should sparkle and engage the reader because history lives in the telling. It is more than

Good book design plays an important part in telling the story of history. HSSC Fills Gap by Inaugurating Awards

ince 1988, Tom Andrews has inaugurated four awards programs, each focused on recognizing particular kinds of achievements in the study and promotion of history. The FELLOWS Award, Donald H. Pflueger Local History Award, the Community Enrichment Award and the Louise and Joseph O'Flaherty Distinguished Teaching Award have each taken its place as a cherished and respected tribute to individuals whose love of history in various forms has led them to admirable achievements.

The FELLOWS Award

The FELLOWS medallion is given to a select number of individuals who have broadened our vision for history, encouraged the preservation of our historical heritage, and sharpened our sense of personal identity as Southern Californians. Collectively the lifetime achievements of the HSSC FELLOWS have brought distinction to the Los Angeles-Southern California region. In their separate roles, they have taught us how to preserve and promote history.

Community Enrichment

The Southern California Community Enrichment Award recognizes those who have enriched our lives as members of the greater Los Angeles community by making us more aware of the power of history in our own lives. They have crossed ethnic and cultural lines to birng people together, thus promoting the inclusiveness of history. They have dedicated themselves to specific goals, have invested in the education of our young people and have instilled a sense of pride in who we are and where we live.

Endowments and Bequests Ensure Future of Awards and Publications

he Donald H. Pflueger Local History Award is named for an individual who spent his professional career in the service of Southern California's local history. The award is made possible by an endowment established by the family of Donald Pflueger and by a number of his friends. The award recognizes distinguished achievement in the publication and film production of local history in all of its forms, including biographies and generation histories,

Carl Wheat Memorial Award

The Carl Wheat Award is given annually, if so judged, to the author who contributes the outstanding article of historical significance and literary quality to the Quarterly. The award is made possible by an endowment established by the family of Carl I. Wheat, the Los Angeles Corral of Westerners, the Zamorano Club of Los Angeles and the Platrix Chapter of E Clampus Vitus. Recipients of the Carl Irving Wheat Memorial Award are William Mason (1988), Gloria R. Lothrop (1989), Salome Hernandez (1990), Kerwin L. Klein (1991), John M. Allswang (1992), Judson Grenier

(1993), Timothy J. Lukes (1994) and J. David Rogers (1995).

The Scherrer, Lippitt and **Carpenter Estates**

Robert Francis Scherrer was a long-time member of the Historical Society who collected a house full of books on Western history and printing. He enjoyed the programs and publications of the Society. Before his death on January 21, 1991, he included the Society in his will so that it might continue to publish in the areas that had interested him.

Henry F. Lippitt, 2nd, served on the board of the Historical Society for two and a half decades and as treasurer for 18 years before his death in 1994. He made a significant contribution to the Society by managing its finances with both expertise and vision. The publication of the Quarterly was especially dear to him.

Edwin H. Carpenter also collected a house full of books and also was a longtime member of the Historical Society, having joined in the early 1930s. At his death in January 1994, he left a portion of his estate to the Society to further its publications efforts and its education programs for history teachers.

These generous bequests demonstrate

HSSC Inaugurates **Programs for Teachers**

he O'Flaherty Distinguished Teaching Award recognizes excellence and innovation in the teaching of history in the public, private, and parochial schools of Los Angeles County. The award, made possible by the generosity of the O'Flaherty family, includes art, music, drama, literature, genealogy and multimedia technology as effective ways of making history an exciting part of the daily experience of students. The award encourages programs that take students into the community and ones that bring the community into the classroom.

History Conference

"History is a treasure to be shared by the schools, museums and historical societies of our community." Acting on this belief, Tom Andrews will help HSSC conduct its third history conference for teachers, students and the general public. The first conference was held at Heritage Square and emphasized Southern California local history in the setting of restored Victorian structures. Since January 1996 the Autry Museum of Western Heritage

has hosted the conferences under the theme, "Los Angeles: Essence of a Community." Jointly sponsored by the Los Angeles County Office of Education, California State University at Northridge and the Southern California Social Science Association, the conferences have been well attended and well received. Each one attending receives a packet of resource materials which give added perspective to the conference presentations.

Publications for Teachers

HSSC has been a moving force behind placing several publications in the hands of teachers in the public, private and parochial schools of Los Angeles. Thanks to grants from ARCO, the Haynes Foundation and the Murphy Foundation, Msgr. Francis Weber's California Bibliographies and two studies by Gloria Lothrop, A Guide to Historical Outings in Southern California and "The Ethnic Groups of Los Angeles," have been made available to teachers. The last item, which grew out of a response to the 1992 riots, is accompanied by a resource study guide.

HSSC Staff 1986 - 1996

When Tom Andrews arrived at HSSC in 1986, Elizabeth Marsh was the sole employee of the historical society. Betty managed the office and provided continuity in the period between executive directors.

New staff

Six months after Tom's arrival, the Society hired Margaret Dickerson. Her first responsibility—inventorying the Society's assets—rapidly progressed to running the day-to-day activities of the Society. Today Margaret also handles the bookkeeping and coordinates the Society's award luncheons and dinners.

Six months after Margaret's arrival, Carole Dougherty joined the staff. Her responsibilities have changed over the years from tracking membership and coordinating volunteer training to assisting with Society programs. Today, she edits the Southern Californian and coordinates the annual garden fair.


Others followed

Michael Sanborn joined the staff in 1993 to direct membership programs. In his last two years, Michael handled the details for the annual art and book auction and implemented the participation of artists during Museums of the Arroyo Day at the Lummis Home.

In June of 1996, when Michael was appointed curator at the Banning Residence Museum in Wilmington, Michele Clark came on board. Michele brings computer and direct marketing expertise to the Historical Society and is developing programs to increase membership and book sales.

HSSC member and fundraising expert, Denise Martin Campbell, became a consultant to the Society in 1987 to help increase major donations.

Landscape architect Jane Frimodig and later, volunteer Mary Brooks were hired to maintain the garden. Working with nearly 25 volunteers each second Sunday and together on Fridays, the two oversee volunteers and maintain the Lummis Nursery.

Lummis Garden 1986 - 1996

The garden that Charles Lummis grew was enclosed by rows of eucalyptus and a lemon tree hedge. In front of the house—alongside fruit trees, rabbit hutches and a vegetable garden—a field of wildflowers bloomed each spring.

Student project

In 1985, when Cal Poly Pomona students Cy Carlberg, Rick Fisher and Woody Smeck developed a waterwise garden plan for a class project, thenexecutive director Jackie Wilson was captivated by the potential of renovating the garden and making it a focus of water conservation for Southern Californians.

Armed with the plan, Wilson received a \$80,000 grant from the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy. The HSSC board then commissioned Bob Perry, the students' professor, to design a low-maintenance, water-conserving garden.

In 1986—the first year of a six-year drought—phase one of the garden was completed. Volunteers under the able leadership of Suzie Chamberlain extended the worth of the grant by installing plants and later, maintaining the garden.

Mayor brings major support

Mayor Tom Bradley's visit during the 1988 garden open house drew the attention of the Los Angeles Department of Water & Power and the Metropolitan Water District. Together they underwrote the second phase of the garden—the final installation of plants to the garden's boundaries.

The last phase—installation of plant signs and educational panels—was completed with two grants from The Ralph M. Parsons Foundation.

Today, the garden amply demonstrates a garden can be lush and green on half the water of a conventional garden. And now in the spring when again the wildflowers bloom, we all enjoy Lummis's new garden.
