GLEN DAWSON RECEIVES SPECIAL HONOR

At the December 6 Open House festivities, Glen Dawson was named the first FELLOW OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA. The announcement was made by Executive Director Tom Andrews who also indicated that a more formal presentation and program will follow in the Spring. Glen Dawson was the unanimous choice of the Board of Directors for this initial honor. With this announcement, the Historical Society launches its new program of honoring exceptional contributions to California History by designating the awardees as FELLOWS OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA.

Glen Dawson is a distinguished Los Angeles bookman and a major disseminator of historical knowledge in the southern California area. A former Board Member of the Historical Society, he is an editor and publisher of numerous historical works about California and the West, southern California, Los Angeles, and Baja California.

His is a lifetime of service dedicated to furthering the best interests of history throughout our local communities and the state.

The welcome of his presence at Dawson's Book Shop, Westerners, Zamorano Club, the Historical Society, and at college, university, and public libraries has enlarged and enriched the historical dimension within each of us.
