JACOB ZEITLIN: FRIEND TO THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

On Sunday evening, August 30, Jacob (Jake) Zeitlin, who first joined the Historical Society of Southern California in February, 1929, died at his West Hollywood home. Jake was 84 and had undergone heart bypass surgery some three months earlier. His passing is a loss to all who love rare and fine printed books; to all who value history, literature, photography, and art; to all who are concerned about the role of censorship, and to all who enjoy warm and gracious hospitality when it is extended.

One of the most celebrated of California's many outstanding booksellers, Jake left behind an enduring legacy, one that recently touched the Historical Society. Although in deteriorating health, he agreed to be a member of the Honorary Committee for our June 4 Gala at The Huntington in recognition of Doyce Nunis's 25 years as editor of the Southern California Quarterly. He must have known he would be unable to attend, but he made us feel that the honor was his to be asked, and he emphasized how pleased he was to support such an important function. That was Jacob Zeitlin - and that is why his presence among us all these years was such a special gift.

BIXBY LAND COMPANY SPONSORS THE FALL ISSUE OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA QUARTERLY

With the Fall 1987 issue of the Southern California Quarterly, due at the end of October, the important relationship between the Historical Society and some of the great, historic corporations of southern California continues. The second corporation to sponsor an individual issue of the Quarterly is the Bixby Land Company of Long Beach. The company's historical roots go back to the early years of the California Gold Rush and the organization of Flint, Bixby & Co. by three gold-seeking relatives, Benjamin and Thomas Flint and Lewellyn Bixby. Between 1855 and 1883, Flint, Bixby & Co. purchased several ranchos in northern and southern California, including Rancho Los Cerritos in 1866 and Rancho Los Alamitos in 1883. In 1896 Flint, Bixby & Co. was dissolved and the Bixby Land Company was incorporated. An attractive photo-essay on the company's history and accomplishments will conclude the articles in the Fall issue.

Under the leadership of Jean Bixby Smith, President, the Bixby Land Company, which celebrates its 91st anniversary, oversees the management of widespread commercial properties and business parks in Long Beach and western Orange County. Six of the seven directors of the company are direct descendants of the founders, Lewellyn and Jotham Bixby, and more than 90% of the company's stock is held by blood relatives of the two brothers. It is an impressive family endeavor that has been continuously involved in the history of California for 136 years.

THE NEW HSSC STAFF

With the resignation of Betty Marsh, who served the Historical Society effectively in various capacities for nearly six years, the HSSC staff has been reorganized. During September Carole Z. Dougherty was appointed to the staff as a replacement for Betty. Carole's experience and responsibilities compliment those of the second staff member, Margaret A. Dickerson, who joined the HSSC staff in March.
