"THE CALIFORNIA DREAM: FROM CABRILLO TO GETTY" 1986-87 Programs

The Program Committee has chosen as its theme for the year "The California Dream: Cabrillo to Getty," and the bi-monthly programs will focus on an aspect of California history which was the fulfillment of someone's dream. The members of the Committee promise interesting speakers, affordable places, and an opportunity to meet members and officers of the Society.

October 22, 1986 - "JUAN RODRÍQUEZ CABRILLO AND THE EXPLORATION OF CALIFORNIA." Dr. Harry Kelsey, past President of the Historical Society and Chief of the History Division at the Los Angeles County Museum of Natural History, will be our speaker and sign copies of his new book about this early California explorer. This will be a dinner meeting at a local restaurant, and members will receive invitations.

December 7, 1986 - Holiday Open House at the Lummis Home. This traditional event will honor our many volunteers and long-time members of the Society. Guests will be able to preview the new garden.

The January meeting will focus on another "dream" of California, the mining boom and its impact on the state. In March we plan a tour of the Getty Museum; formal dedication of the new Garden will be in April; the Annual Meeting will be held in May, and the Annual Trek in June; and we hope to schedule a trip to Santa Cruz Island in July. Detailed information about each program will be included in the bi-monthly *Newsletter* and special invitations.

LUMMIS HOME GARDEN

As reported in the last *Newsletter*, the first phase of the garden has been completed, and funding is being sought for completion. The garden volunteers have spent many hours doing routine maintenance—weeding, watering, pruning, and planning for the future.

A dedicated corps of gardeners has been volunteering regularly in the garden, contributing seventy to eighty hours a month.

They are in need of supplies and equipment in order to keep the garden in its newly developed condition. NEWS FROM THE SOCIETY

Recently, Mexico awarded a silver medal, its top tourism award, to Bill Escherich, past President of the Society, in "recognition of his valuable assistance in increasing tourism in Mexico."

Dr. John Kemble, Board member and member of the California State Historic Resources Commission, is seeking public participation in the development of criteria for a state register of historical resources. He sends the following request.

The Legislature of California has charged the State Historical Resources Commission with the development of criteria and procedures for a California Register of Historical Resources to be proposed for enactment by the Legislature. In carrying out this charge, the commission is anxious to elicit as much public participation as possible. Should the proposed register be a compilation of places already on the National Register, the State Landmarks and Points of Historical Interest? Should it be more comprehensive to include structures which have been moved from their original sites? Should it include museum artifacts and collections? Should it be a much more restrictive list of places which have had a demonstrable state-wide significance? The commission must formulate its recommendation at its meeting in early November, and therefore would much appreciate early expressions of opinion or recommendations.
