Our New Logo - San Carlos

The Spanish naval packetboat <u>San Carlos</u> played a vital part in the history of Spanish California. Built on the banks of the Santiago River, 26 miles north of the port of San Blas, Mexico, in 1767, she served as transport and supply vessel for ports along the Pacific Coast of New Spain. In 1769 she played a vital part in the expedition to found missions and presidios in Alta California. It was her timely arrival at San Diego with sorely-needed supplies which saved that first effort under Fr. Serra and Captain Portola from failure. In 1775 she was dispatched north from Monterey on a voyage of reconnaissance, and on August 5 that year she was the first European vessel to enter San Francisco Bay.

The reconstruction of <u>San Carlos's</u> appearance is the work of Raymond Aker of Palo Alto, and it is through his kind permission that the Historical Society of Southern California uses it. A trained mariner, naval architect and draftsman, Mr. Aker has made important contributions to California history by his research into ships and voyages of the past. No original plans of <u>San Carlos</u> have survived, but contemporary recorded dimensions and detailed inventories plus logs, correspondence and a careful study of naval shipbuilding practice of the period have provided the basis for Mr. Aker's reconstruction. The picture of <u>San Carlos</u> previously used by the Society depicted a vessel much more like Columbus's <u>Santa Maria</u> of 1492 than <u>San Carlos</u> of 1767.

Garden Reception

A new feature initiated at the September 18th Reception to meet the new officers and directors of the Historical Society was a self-guided tour of the gardens. The grounds are now marked with twelve plaques designating examples of the Southern California flora. The tour is outlined in an attractive brochure prepared through the cooperation of the Horticulture Division of the City Department of Recreation and Parks. If you were not able to attend our reception, you will find it worthwhile to visit the Lummis Home especially to take the garden tour with the help of the new brochure. As time goes on, both the markings and descriptive material will be expanded to include still other plants in the gardens.

Golden Spike Ceremony at Lang Station

Your Society was one of the sponsors of a program on September 5 to celebrate the centennial of the driving of the last spike in the railroad connecting Los Angeles with San Francisco in 1876. Other participants included the Southern Pacific Railroad, the Chinese community, E Clampus Vitus and other historical groups. In spite of a dusty wind, this day could be termed most successful, with good publicity on television and in the newspapers.

Historical Highland Park Saluted

Heralding the sponsorship and publication of an attractive leaflet, the Historical Society honored its historical neighbors in Highland Park with a special program and dinner at Lawry's California Center on October 6. The booklet highlights the Lummis Home, Southwest Museum, Casa de Adobe, Heritage Square and the Native Sons of the Golden West—Ramona Parlor and Museum.

Our honored guests included Dr. Carl Dentzel, Director of the Southwest Museum (which also operates Casa de Adobe) and Mr. and Mrs. Ed Silvestri. Ed is President of the Cultural Heritage Foundation which sponsors Heritage Square.

The program consisted of slides depicting the history of Heritage Square and its preservation and restoration projects. Narration was provided by First Vice President Stewart Rogers, who has been active in the Cultural Heritage Foundation since its founding. Thousands of people who travel the Pasadena Freeway are familiar with the "old houses" along the Arroyo Seco all clumped together at Heritage Square, but Society members were interested to learn more about the project in detail.
