APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP

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Justin George Turner 1898 - 1976

Justin G. Turner, former President and Chairman of the Board of Directors, died June 17 at the age of seventy-seven. Born in Chicago and a resident of Los Angeles since 1943, he attended the University of Chicago and received his LL.B. from DePaul University in 1920.

A distinguished scholar of the American Civil War, he was a bookman and a renowned collector of historical manuscripts and a contributor to numerous historical journals. He was the co-author, with his daughter-in-law Linda Turner, of *Mary Todd Lincoln; Her Life and Letters*, selected by the History Book Club, and awarded a prize for the best biography of 1972 by Chicago Friends of Literature.

Mr. Turner was past President of the Manuscript Society, the Civil War Roundtable of Southern California, Friends of the UCLA Library, an honorary member of the National Civil War Centennial Commission and an honorary President of the Southern California Jewish Historical Society.

In recognition of his services for his fellowman and his selfless service to the cause of American History, he was awarded an honorary LL.D. from Lincoln College and an honorary L.H.D. from the University of Judaism in 1960. In 1967, the same University presented the Eternal Light Award to Justin and his late brother Maurice. He received the Lincoln Diploma of honor from the Lincoln Memorial University at Harrogate, Tennessee, and the National Award for Community Services from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America.

Society members will recall Mr. Turner's long association with this organization, his zeal for history, his concern for the preservation of historical manuscripts and books. He will be missed by all who knew and admired him.

Justin is survived by his wife Gertrude, his son Paul, daughter Barbara and four grandchildren.

Golden Spike Centennial Celebration at Lang Station

To celebrate the driving of the last spike in the railroad connecting Los Angeles with San Francisco in 1876, a commemorative program will be held on Sunday, September 5, at the site of Lang Station, just off Highway 14 in Soledad Canyon. There will be special exhibits and musical entertainment from 1 to 4 p.m. and the re-enactment of the driving of the golden spike at 4:30 p.m., accompanied by brief speeches, the dedication of plaques and a Chinese lion dance. A barbecue dinner and dance at the Mint Canyon Elks Lodge on Sierra Highway, costing \$4.00 per person, will close the day. A limited supply of souvenir gold-plated spikes will be offered for \$15.00 plus tax.

Tool Exhibit

An unusual exhibition, "The Tool as Object," is being presented at the Craft and Folk Art Museum now through October 3rd. There is no admission charge to the display which is featured at the attractive museum, which is a part of the Egg and the Eye at 5814 Wilshire Boulevard, across from the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

The exhibition focuses on tools as aesthetic rather than functional objects. It primarily includes 19th-century Anglo-American hand tools which highlight the artistry of the toolmaker. Curated by Dr. Edward Tuttle of U.C.L.A., the exhibition emphasizes the tension and balance between functional and economic demands, on one hand, and the toolmaker's artistic impulses on the other.

Rather than being grouped by trades, the tools are grouped and displayed according to their more general functions, i.e., hewing, planing, boring, measuring and pounding. An accompanying catalogue, illustrated and hand-set, gives the tools' names, uses and approximate dates. Also included is an annotated listing of California tool collections which are accessible to the public.
