HSSC was proud to honor John and Lyn Pohlmann as Fellows of the Society for exceptional lifetime achievement that has brought distinction to the history of California and the West. A distinguished historian, teacher and scholar who retired from Cal Poly Pomona in 2015, John published his master's thesis on oil tycoon and developer Alphonzo Bell in the Southern California Quarterly in 1964. He joined the HSSC board and served eight years as its president (2006-2014), successfully leading the Society through a major turning point when the city of Los Angeles declined to renew the Society's lease for the landmark Lummis House, the HSSC's headquarters for 50 years. We are delighted to be able to recognize John's leadership and John and Lyn's generous support of the Society for half a century.
